

In this painting I sought to confront the patriarchal heteronormative ideologies of inequality that oppress, silence, control, and placate women. The circular cake represents opportunities in a stratified systems of privilege where women are merely allowed a piece. The portion served sadly varies based on race, religion, status, sexuality, ableism, and conformity to name a fraction of factors of discrimination and inequalities of women as a group. The Pastel colors acknowledge gender roles and expectations of women to be feminine, soft, happy, muted, deferential, and almost childlike in order to gain a slice. The subject matter hints and the unpaid domestic labor of women whose labors have sustained men providing them the entire cake of opportunities and privileges that empower them.
